What is IXP neutrality?

- A term used by many (most?) IXPs to describe themselves
- However, largely undefined:
 - Possible interpretations may include fairness, transparency, published price list, non-competence with its participants, non-competence with the carriers, ownership/governance by its own members, ...
 - Even if we did agree on the high-level definition, still a lot of room of interpretation of how this would be implemented by each IXP
- Eventually, the term "neutrality" does not add any value and it is often confusing or misleading

The IXP Neutrality Project



Will attempt to define IXP neutrality in the form of a Standard

IXP Neutrality Standard: A list of well defined, measurable/verifiable criteria

- guide and protect IXPs that want to become/remain neutral;
- help IXP participants identify such IXPs and
- set the right expectations in the IXP<-> IXP participants relationship

For IXP participants:

- reduce uncertainty and fear of providerlock; help in building trust.
- Minimize commercial and contractual negotiation.

For neutral IXPs:

- Shorter negotiations; quicker sales
- neutrality can act as a tool to defend pricing, contractual terms and service offerings.
- better service portfolio; consistent, uniform service implementations -> quicker delivery and simpler ops.
- a "trusted partner" within the local market



How we perceive IXP neutrality



Neutrality = Fairness +

- Fair & equal treatment by an IXP towards its members
- Extends to: Services,
 Delivery, SLA, Pricing,
 Contractual/Terms, ...

Transparency

- At least some transparency, to the degree required fairness
- Important in cases of "deviations"

>>> the community will provide definition and answers



Domain of applicability



IXP core services

- The services that relate to the core IXP business and are necessary for it
 - including at least the physical access ports, the local peering service, the route servers (if provided by the IXP) and the support for these services.

IXP additional services

- Other services that directly relate to the IXP operation (and would not make sense to be provided by the IXP operator if it was not running an IXP business)
 - for example, colocation services, cloud exchange services, consulting services etc. that it might be
 also offering.
- Non-IXP-related services:

Mandatory or advisory clauses



Mandatory:

meaning any IXP claiming to be neutral in accordance to the standard must fulfil these requirements

Advisory:

meaning that a neutral IXP may or may not take any notice of these clauses

the word "shall" in respect of the mandatory clauses,
 but not for advisory clauses.

Self-Statement *



Draft requirement:

 The IXP operator shall publish a self-statement of transparency and neutrality per IXP that it operates.

- It is proposed to be mandatory
- This is the key compliance clause, so must be mandatory.
- It has the role of making any claims of neutrality really clear.

Published Portfolio



Draft requirement:

 A published service portfolio shall exist which will list all the IXP services offered by the IXP and all their options that affect pricing. If applicable, delivery times and SLA of these services shall be included.

- It is proposed to be mandatory
- Without this, the defined scope of a particular IXP claiming to be neutral is unclear, so it makes no sense for it to be optional

Published Price List *



Draft requirement:

 A published price list shall exist, including setup and recurring fees for provisioning, upgrading and terminating of all IXP services within the published portfolio. Each version of the pricelist shall include its effective start date and shall describe how it will be applied to existing IXP services (e.g., if pricing of existing services will be updated to the effective pricelist or not, etc.).

- It is proposed to be mandatory
- For many people, this is going to be the very visible 'acid test' of IXP neutrality, so it makes no sense for it to be optional

Promotions, discounts & offers *



Draft requirement:

Promotions, discounts and offers shall be published. The IXP operator shall not provide promotions, discounts or offers that are photographic to a specific member. Waiving of fees (e.g., for DNS operators or other services or infrastructure for the "common good") are clearly stated according to these terms.

- It is proposed to be mandatory
- Without this being mandatory, it will leave plenty of scope for the published price list
 clause to be less effective than it seems at face value

Contract *



Draft requirements:

- A published contract template shall exist.
- This contract shall include all articles that constitute the business relationship between the IXP operator and an IXP participant.
- This contract shall be common for all IXP participants.
- Any referenced or related document with this contract (e.g., order forms for services, annexes, appendixes) shall be published as well.
- If the IXP operator offers non-IXP services, such services (and their terms) do not need to be included into the template as long as they are sufficiently separated.

Should this clause be mandatory or not?

- It is proposed to be mandatory
- This will be another of the 'acid test' of IXP neutrality clauses, so it should probably be mandatory

Terms of Use



- Draft requirement:
 - The IXP terms of use shall be published.
- Should this clause be mandatory or not?
 - It is proposed to be mandatory
 - If the contract clause is mandatory, it doesn't make too much sense for this to be optional

Member list *



Draft requirement:

The list of connected networks shall be listed publicly and shall be available via APIs (e.g.,
 IX-F Member Export).

- It is proposed to be mandatory
- The vast majority of IXP users (99+%?) will want this to be mandatory, and there are just a few unusual/untypical ASNs that want to be present at IXPs and not in lists

PeeringDB



- Draft requirement:
 - The IXP operator shall be listed and maintain an updated record in PeeringDB.
- Should this clause be mandatory or not?
 - The mandatory/advisory aspect is up for debate
 - There will be huge (overwhelming?) support for this to be mandatory, but it is open for debate

Traffic graphs



- Draft requirement:
 - The IXP shall have its aggregated traffic graphs publicly available.
- Should this clause be mandatory or not?
 - It is proposed to be mandatory
 - Another 'acid test' clause for neutrality.
 - It is probably only non-neutral IXPs that don't make their traffic graphs public.

Right to participate



Draft requirement:

The IXP shall publish their legal, business and technical requirements for their participants and they shall accept all applications of new participants that meet these requirements, unless significant, justified, technical, legal or business constraint exists.

- It is proposed to be mandatory
- Another 'acid test' clause for neutrality.
- Why would a genuinely neutral exchange turn away prospective members who met their joining criteria?

Communication Channels



Draft requirement:

The IXP must clearly state and publish the channels of communications (including support) between the IXP and its members. This includes but not limited to: technical, financial, operational, policy and administrative issues.

- The mandatory/advisory aspect is up for debate
- Perhaps some ASNs don't really care about this, judging by their level of engagement and how they ignore IXP communications?

Service Uniformity



Draft requirement:

The IXP shall implement the services of the service portfolio in a uniform manner, without implementing substantially different service offerings for different participants that are receiving the same service. The terms of use shall govern all IXP participants.

- It is proposed to be mandatory
- In practice, neutrality implies service uniformity for production services; perhaps we can have an advisory note to say that this is not intended to apply to trials, which should at least be documented so that participants know they are happening? That last part could be controversial.
- Still in active discussion

Service provisioning



Draft requirement:

The IXP shall accept and implement without unnecessary delay all valid members' requests for provisioning, modification or decommission of services within the service portfolio. Requests shall not be rejected or unreasonably delayed unless a significant, justified reason exists.

- It is proposed to be mandatory
- This is an 'acid test' clause for neutrality. Why would a genuinely neutral exchange discriminate on service?
- This has to do with service delivery times which should not vary based on the importance of a given member

Service costs



Draft requirement:

All members shall be charged the same fee for the same services, according to the published price list. Any exception to this, shall be clearly known in advance to all participating members of the IXP.

Should this clause be mandatory or not?

- It is proposed to be mandatory
- This is the implementation clause of the 'publish a price list' policy requirement.

Ordering & Charging



Draft requirement:

 Orders must clearly state the services and corresponding prices. Prices cannot be bundled or aggregated in ways not explicitly described on the public price list.

- To be resolved
- This might be construed as a novel requirement in the standard, so we are still discussing this.
- For orders, there should be no bundling or cross-selling in a way that pricing for the IXP services is unclear.

Maintenance



Draft requirement:

 All maintenance and service related information shall be communicated equally to all members. Outages & service degradation issues must be communicated in a timely manner to all IXP members.

- It is proposed to be mandatory
- What has to be mandatory here is that any scheduled maintenance on the IXP should be properly announced and communicated to all IXP members. A neutral IXP should have published its scheduled maintenance slots.

Support levels/response times



- Draft requirement:
 - Clause text to be added
- Should this clause be mandatory or not?
 - It is proposed to be mandatory
 - A neutral IXP should announce beforehand its service support levels and response times.
